From Amazon.com: Family secrets of Nazi Germany are at the core of this powerful first novel told in two narratives that alternate between New Heidelberg, Minnesota, in the present, and the small town of Weimar near Buchenwald during World War II. Trudy is a professor of German history in Minnesota, where she's teaching a seminar on women's roles in Nazi Germany and conducting interviews with Germans about how they're dealing with what they did during the war. But her mother, Anna, won't talk about it. Trudy knows, she remembers, that Anna was mistress to a big Nazi camp officer. Why did she do it? Was he Trudy's father? The interviews introduce a range of attitudes, from blatant racism to crippling survivor guilt. Anna's story is a gripping mystery in a page-turner that raises universal questions of shame, guilt, and personal responsibility.

### **RUMMAGE SALE - SATURDAY, APRIL 25 from 9 to 2**

**Is it time to edit your wardrobe?** You know, remove those items you don't wear because they are the wrong size, color, or style and add something fun, fresh, and reasonably priced that just says, "You!" The church rummage sale is just around the corner, and we are happy to accept all clothing items (clean and in good condition) that you are ready to edit out of your wardrobe and give you the opportunity to find some special additions to enhance the whole.

Along with gently worn clothing for men, women, and children and all manner of accessories (hats, scarves, belts, gloves, wallets, pocketbooks), we are also seeking household goods of every description: linens (sheets, blankets, bedspreads, pillows, cushions, towels, tablecloths, napkins, place mats, table runners, curtains, shower curtains, bath mats), housewares (dishes, mugs, glasses, utensils, pots and pans, bake ware, vases, lamps, and small appliances in working order), books, and small pieces of furniture (something that can be carried by one medium sized woman.)

- \_\_\_\_\_ Clean out closets, drawers, and cupboards and bag or box donations.

- \_\_\_\_\_ Save and bring in large clean brown bags (or other large bags), preferably with handles
- \_\_\_\_\_ **VOLUNTEER** to work Thursday and/or Friday sorting and pricing. We begin at 9 each morning and work both afternoons and Thursday evening.
- \_\_\_\_\_ **VOLUNTEER** to sell for all or part of the day and/or clean up at 2 on Saturday.
- \_\_\_\_\_ Share information about the sale with friends, neighbors, and family members who are rummage sale fans.
  - \_\_\_\_\_ invite them to work with you
  - \_\_\_\_\_ invite them to make donations.

Items may be brought to church starting the week of the sale and left in the chapel; however, if it is at all possible, bring them in on Thursday (the 23rd) when they can be sorted right onto the tables. Workers will be on hand all day and into the evening to accept your donations. **Please bring everything in by Thursday.**

**We cannot say too often how much we need your help!** This is a huge undertaking, much too big to be left to the same few women who have been involved for years. In order for the sale to go smoothly on Saturday, we need many sorters and pricers on Thursday and Friday. We need strong backs to unload cars and tote boxes. We need people to test electrical equipment. We need people to ferret out the good stuff and price it accordingly. We need an energetic clean up crew. We need lots of volunteers. We need you! So please, save us the trouble of tracking you down. Volunteer! And if you have friends who like this sort of activity, invite them to join you. We can always use more help.

## **Mission and Justice projects**

### **Mother's Day Collection for Sandra's Lodge**

For the last several years we have done one or two collections a year for Sandra's Lodge in Waltham, with Ann Bruhn being our contact and deliverer. At this time Ann says they can use socks, hand sanitizer soaps (push plastic bottles), boxes of Kleenex, \$5 gift certificates for CVS, Walgreens, etc. You're encouraged to think of both the kids and the Moms. We will collect up to May 3<sup>rd</sup>, so we can deliver in time for Mother's Day. If you have questions, contact Ann Bruhn or Jill Lewis. Briefly, the Lodge is an emergency intake family shelter for homeless single mothers and their children. The program is funded by the Department of Transitional Assistance and provides a safe environment with ancillary services to thirty-five homeless families. The essential goals of the program are to secure permanent, affordable housing for its residents and offer the appropriate support services which will enable the family to function independently. ### **Mug challenge**

The Mission and Justice committee invites you to participate in an activity starting on April 19<sup>th</sup> and continuing through the remainder of the church year as a way to celebrate our planet Earth. Starting on April 19<sup>th</sup> please bring your own mug or coffee cup to Coffee Hour to help cut down on our paper waste. On average, 40 – 50 used cups are thrown away each week; that's at least 2600 cups a year added to our waste. Hope you are up for the challenge!

### **Trail clean-up**

As part of our Earth Month celebration, the Mission and Justice Ministry invites you to join us for a few hours of spring cleaning along the path that parallels Route 2, between Lake St. and Pleasant St., Arlington on **Saturday, May 9 at 9 a.m.**

The Event is hosted by the Spy Pond Environment Task Group. The work will involve trail maintenance, controlling invasive plants, pruning vistas, trash pick up, and generally improving this scenic slice of public land. All equipment and snacks will be provided. Participants should bring sturdy footwear, work clothes, water, hat and sunscreen, rain gear. Liability waivers will be available and must be signed by all participants (under 18 need approval from—and are preferably accompanied by—a parent or guardian).

### **Membership Ministry Update**

Growing the membership of PACC is something that God calls us to do as well as something that is needed for the long term health of the church. Over the past several years we have continued to add new members every year, but this has only allowed the membership to hold steady and not grow our overall membership.

Our Membership Ministry was created do the important work of growing the church. With a more focused effort we should be able to grow our membership beyond its current size and share the good news with a larger church family.

In order to accomplish this, our Membership Ministry is working on two key efforts. These are finding ways that we can attract people who have not been part of our community, and then once they are here, making sure that they feel welcome, comfortable returning, and becoming integrated into the PACC family.

We can use your help in several ways:

It has been demonstrated that the best way to bring in new people is with an invitation from someone who is already part of our church community. We need everyone at PACC to be aware of others they know who could be invited to join us and be looking for opportunities to invite them to visit. Keep in mind that the most comfortable way to do this may be to invite them to some activity related to the church other than the Sunday worship service, although that is not discouraged. Keep in mind other activities you may be involved with such as choir, youth group activities, evening programs, the rummage sale, etc. People tend to continue to visit if they like the people they meet and feel comfortable and welcome. Our ministry is also working on scheduling some activities specifically to invite new people to.

PACC has always done a good job of making visitors feel welcome. When you see someone new, introduce yourself and spend a couple minutes getting to know them.

Come join us at our monthly Membership Ministry meetings. We are meeting the third Tuesday of each month at 7:30 PM in the Fireplace room and are working on these two important aspects of membership. Our next meeting is on April 21.
