The pledging phase of PACC's *Restoring, Renewing, Reaching* Capital Campaign is winding down, and I am thrilled to announce *that to date we have 86 pledges for a total of \$299,238!* Thank you to everyone for your work and prayers and participation in this Capital Campaign.

*If you haven't yet made your campaign pledge, it's not too late, and we still need you.* Every campaign has its own uncertainties, and this one is no exception. It's never clear whether all pledges will end up being paid in full or whether a couple of years down the road cost estimates will turn out to have been inaccurate. Our success to this point is due to the way so many people have contributed what they could. The contributions of those who have yet to send in their pledge can ensure that we have enough money to successfully complete all of the projects we have planned.

You can do that by signing the calendar in the narthex or contacting the church office. You can take the flowers home after the service or deliver them to a shut-in. The cost is \$35 or more; you can indicate on the sign-up sheet how much you would like to pay. Or, if you would like to bring flowers from your garden, they would be welcome.

### **Report on the Spring 2009 Meeting of the Metropolitan Boston Association**

The Spring Meeting of the Metropolitan Boston Association of the Massachusetts Conference, United Church of Christ, was held on Sunday, April 26, 2009 at the United Church of Walpole. In attendance from PACC were Judie and Dick Phelps and Michael Rich. The business meeting included the election of new officers and committee representative for the coming year. Rev. Ken Bailly was elected to the position of Moderator. Bill Albright will continue as Scribe for the Association, a position he has held for several years and for which he does a yeoman's job. The entire assembly gave him a rousing round of applause for the excellent minutes he provides of all the business of the association. By-Law changes were approved, One adding the Scribe (Bill Albright) as a co-signer for all checks of the association which exceed \$5000. The other By-Law changes increased the time and pool of candidates who could be appointed to the Fitness Review Committee and the rescheduling of Ecclesiastical Councils when quorums have not been met.

The next order of business was the approval of the Budget for 2009. This was followed by reports from Rev. Tony Kill on the Committee on Ministry, Rev. Marian Williams on the Committee on Ministerial Standing, Rev. Fran Bogle on Just Peace and Paul Baxter on the City Mission Society.

One item in the report of the Committee on Ministry that will affect PACC in the future cites the expansion of the role of the local church's In Care committees. The local In Care Committee will be asked to meet with each of their In Care candidates and their advisors to review their polity paper, in order to explore and evaluate how well the candidate has integrated the ecclesiology, Polity and practices of the UCC. "Candidates in Care" will now be called "Members in Discernment", terminology recommended by the National UCC's Ministry Issues Implementation Committee. It was also reported that MBA will be requiring Boundary Awareness Training for all Clergy.

The Just Peace Ministry report included the many facets of this mission. The Just Peace Players will be focusing on ecology and caring for creation. The Just Arts Program continues to focus on art, spirituality and Justice and invites new members to join in. A new Urban Youth Photography Project used photography to help 6-10<sup>th</sup> graders experience and record God's presence in their lives and in the world around them and is looking for invitations from youth groups to participate. The Women of the

Greatest Generation Project is looking for women who lived through the Second World War to record their stories of faith, hope, love and courage.

The City Mission Society has a fund-raiser with Shaw's Market. Folks who shop at Shaw's and wish to donate part of their grocery bill to the City Mission, should go to [www.shaws.com](http://www.shaws.com), click on "Community Rewards", click on the "Shoppers Login or register with your Shaw's Rewards Card" link. Once logged in, click "Sign Me Up". Make "City Mission Society" your community rewards partner (ID number 49001018925). I hope that, if you shop at Shaw's, you will do this as it is a painless way to support City Mission Society.

Rev. Wendy VanderHart, Associate Conference Minister greeted the assembly and reported on the changes in the MBA since the last Fall meeting.

The topic for the speakers at the meeting was "Turning the Tables: A Prophetic Response to the Economy". Speakers were Larry Gordon, senior organizer with the Greater Boston Interfaith Organization (GBIO), an organization that develops local leadership among congregations and faith-based communities. Gordon spoke on organizing and working for social transformation and justice. Gordon also spoke of the changes that have taken place between the 3 anchors in our communities – market, government, and civil society (which includes religious groups, unions, PTA's, volunteer organizations and any organization in which the members of the group have a shared interest). His talk gave us much to think about regarding how and why our economy is in trouble. Rev. Dan Smith spoke on the church's response and the plans that GBIO has for further actions especially around small group meetings, telling the stories of economic hardship, and efforts to begin to rebuild our communities and our nation.

A "Sharing the Abundance" liturgy and communion service ended the assembly.
