Sarah's Circle to discuss *My Stroke of Insight*

My Stroke of Insight: A Brain Scientist's Personal Journey by Jill Bolte Taylor, Ph.D. will be the topic when Sarah's Circle meets on Saturday, October 10, from 10 a.m. until 12 noon in the Fireplace Room. If you wish to meditate, please come at 9:30 a.m.

From the Amazon review: When Jill Bolte Taylor, a 37-year-old brain scientist, experienced a massive stroke, she observed her own mind completely deteriorate to the point that she could not walk, talk, read, write, or recall any of her life. It would take eight years to heal completely. Today Taylor is convinced that the stroke was the best thing that could have happened to her. It has taught her that the feeling of nirvana is never more than a thought away. By *stepping to the right of our left brains*, we can all uncover the feelings of well-being and peace that are so often sidelined by our own brain chatter. A fascinating journey into the mechanics of the human mind, *My Stroke of Insight* is both a valuable recovery guide for anyone touched by a brain injury and an emotionally stirring testimony that deep internal peace truly is accessible to anyone, at any time.

PACC-Men plan to explore Purgatory - a PACC-Family event

Saturday, October 3rd - Going a little ways south on that weekend we should be hitting that area's peak foliage season making the drive and the scenic views at the park quite glorious. Gather at PACC at 10:00 to carpool to Sutton, MA (about an hour's drive mostly on the pike and then a bit south). We'll spend about 2 hours exploring the walking trails and pseudo-caves. Bring or pick up snacks at the fast food places along the last leg of the trip as it does not appear that there is any concession stand in the park itself. (There is a visitor center and accessible bathrooms though.)

Those who will need additional sustenance for the trip back from Purgatory plan to stop at either the Long Horn Steakhouse or T.G.I.Friday's which are on the road between Purgatory and the Pike.

Report on special congregational meeting of September 13

The Capital Campaign Implementation Committee is planning to have work on the Chapel begin after Christmas and be completed before Easter. Given the concerns raised during the Congregational meeting regarding accessibility, the Implementation Committee will be conducting an "inventory" of overall church accessibility issues that could be addressed in the near term, rather than waiting until we're ready to do the ramp and lift. Additionally, the Mission and Justice Ministry will begin working on ideas and recommendations to meet our Outreach goals for the Campaign. that while we have collected \$50,000 so far which enables us to move forward with the Chapel project, we still need you to send in your donations as scheduled. Please contact Christie Getto Young with any Implementation questions. Thank you.

Report from the Council of Deacons

- The Council of Deacons has prioritized tasks that require its attention. All of the items at the top of the list are financial: 2009 budget shortfall, fundraisers, the 2010 budget and a ten-year financial plan.
- Judie Phelps and Karen Friedman were appointed voting delegates at the Massachusetts Conference, UCC, annual meeting October 16-17.
- A group has met with a consultant at the Mass. Conference about this fall's stewardship drive. The task force includes Linda Cohn, Tim Durning, Anne Kelly Contini, Ken Miller and Josh Young with participation by Bill Albright.
- The election for the 2010 Council of Deacons will begin with distribution of ballots October 25. They must be returned by November 9 and will be counted by Bill Albright, Valerie Censabella, Don Cohn and Mike Rich.
- The Council confirmed Mike Rich and Valerie Censabella's selection of Betty Gitlin-Rich as one of two Fundraising Co-coordinators. The other co-coordinator is still considering the position. Both co-coordinators will be officially installed later this month.
- The Council acknowledged a generous, anonymous gift of a beautifully redecorated upstairs kitchen and new equipment and accessories for both kitchens. More details are elsewhere in this edition of the *Spire* in an article from the Fellowship and Care Ministry.

The next meeting of the Council of Deacons will be on Tuesday, October 13, instead of the usual second Monday, due to the Columbus Day holiday on the 12th. Council meetings are open to all though only Deacons are eligible to vote. Agendas are available in the narthex on Sunday mornings before meetings.

They Could be Homeless

Sue Kupfer, coordinator of Urban Mission Experience/St. Louis, a program for youth in grades 6-12, says she is “touched by the youth that come to work with us and the transformation that occurs for some as they experience how God’s love and grace touches loves.”

A recent experience that touched Sue’s heart involved a 7th grader named Josh. “Josh was part of a middle school group from a St. Louis suburb,” says Sue. “The group worked in food pantries, a low-income day care center, and a shelter for women and children who are victims of domestic abuse. The kids also took part in a walk through downtown St. Louis that depicts, in a small way, the path a homeless person would need to travel to have their basic human needs met.

“After walking ‘The Trail,’ Josh wanted to talk about how he felt. He said that after this experience he would not view people in the same way. When noticing a person walking around with a backpack, he would not assume they were a student, and when noticing someone carrying a suitcase he would not assume they were a traveler. With tears in his eyes he said very softly, ‘They could be homeless and need our help.’ Josh’s message brought tears to my eyes. It meant that he ‘got’ what we hope the youth coming to our program will understand.”

As a 2008 recipient of a Neighbors in Need grant, Urban Mission Experience/St. Louis’ goal is to try to open the eyes of young people to things that go on in their city: issues of poverty, hunger, oppression and discrimination.
